## Bruno... Joyce... Lacan, three heretics: From infinite worlds to the knots of desire

Discussing Finnegans Wake, while competent accounts of Giambattista Vico's system are often provided, one rarely finds clear explanations of Giordano Bruno's complex ideas, often reduced to the "coincidence of contraries," a term he had borrowed from Nicholas of Cusa. Joyce himself ended up radically changing his mind about the nature of Bruno's philosophy. In fact, Bruno was one of the first figures of rebellion that Joyce had chosen for himself, opting for a similar kind of heresy, thus risking if not his life (Bruno was burned at the stake by the Roman Inquisition in 1600), at least his career and reputation. Bruno also became a model for Lacan who quoted him regularly. All three, Bruno, Joyce and Lacan, identified themselves as "heretics." For Bruno, the revolutionary jolt came from the discovery of the infinity of worlds, for Joyce it was a kind of textual infinity that he was after, for Lacan it was the logic of the signifier that made him break with the dominant psychoanalytic doxa. What is less known is that Bruno launched a theory of "binding" and "knots" in De Vinculis, a last text that anticipates the Lacanian Borromean knot. From Bruno to Lacan via Joyce, one understands how the artist inscribes a symptom as a knot creatively binding the three rings of the Real, the Symbolic and the Imaginary, the heretic trinity (R,S,I).

Jean-Michel Rabaté, Professor of English and Comparative Literature at the University of Pennsylvania, co-editor of the *Journal of Modern Literature*, co-founder of Slought Foundation, is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is the author or editor of more than forty books on modernism, psychoanalysis, philosophy and literary theory.
